 Helping to finalise the stan-dard form of contracts through the BICC to take over the outdated one used by Govern-ment, and hopefully to replace the various forms of contracts adopted by various Architects in the private sector.

• The effect of certain regulaions which may be imposed if Malta joins the E.U. These were discussed during various meetings were held with MIC.

• An emphasis on the impor-tance of Health and Safety measurements which have to be addressed by all contrac-tors. This is one of the major concerns for all. Meetings were held with the Health and Safety Authority in order to enforce the very stringent regulations gradually, since many workers still require training. Various on-the-job Health & Safety education programmes were held with the collaboration of some main contractors.

• The concern that youths are not joining the construction industry because of its present laborious conditions. The situ-ation is aggravated further because of early retirement from the industry due to back-ache. To this effect, discussions are being held to reduce the size and weight of our local stone and to improve building practices. The FOBC has noted with satisfaction that the concrete sector within the industry has improved in great strides and reduced its laborious con-ditions. In fact the main contractors are in line with the major European Countries.

• The importance that all

contractors should be regis-tered, including the establishment of classifications of contractors. This is required due to the fact that very often Government and developers adju-dicate the tenders based on the price considerations only and not on the capability of the contractor.

· The distinguishing between developers and contractors. It is often that contractors are accused of being a nuisance, when in fact contractors are only acting to the instructions given by the Employer. FOBC is also working on new ways of handling certain materials on site in order to reduce the inconvenience to the neighbourhood of a construction

· The protection of the environment. The FOBC places great importance on the role which the construction industry plays in environment aspects, especially due to the intrinsic nature of the indus-
